Dear AE Members, Partners and Friends,

Happy New Year! To God be the glory for the wonderful gift of another year He has accorded us all.

2022 was a significant year for African Enterprise, with a major highlight being the celebration of 60 years in ministry. Our founder, Dr. Michael Cassidy asked God for 50 years in ministry. On a long walk on the beach in the summer of 1961, Michael drew an outline of Africa in the sand and wrote 'Claimed for Christ' inside it.

He initially envisioned training evangelists, when he initiated a leadership centre in Pietermaritzburg, South Africa. Thus, over the last 6 decades, the vision of training evangelists has come alive through the Launch

of African International Institute of Evangelism on 2 September 2022, in Lusaka, Zambia.

The Prayer Breakfast and Institute launch saw over 430 leaders from different parts of the world come together to witness our milestone. Among the key guests, was Her Honour Mutale Nalumango, Vice President of Zambia, the Malawi Presidential Advisor on Religious Affairs, Rev. Brian Kamwendo, and dignitaries from Africa and beyond.

It is an incredible testimony to the Lord's faithfulness and preservation. Throughout the year, we also witnessed moving stories of people's lives being transformed through Jesus Christ.

We collectively reached over **1,737,849** people and of those, **93,096** made the decision to follow Christ.

We remain grateful for God's blessings and provision through our church partners, companions from our Support Offices and the entire strategic partnership, which make it possible to uphold African Enterprise's vision and mission.

Many have come to know the Saviour's love through AE's ministry, and our prayer is that the Lord will continue to go before us, encouraging and equipping us for generations to come as we share His gospel, through word and deed.

Stratified Evangelism



Our pillar, stratified evangelism, aims to proclaim the gospel to every strata of society. We are committed to ensuring that as many people as possible in the cities of Africa hear the gospel where they are, in a language they understand

and through an approach that resonates most with them, be they senior government leaders, business and corporate executives, university professors, open air market traders, unskilled labourers, the unemployed, prisoners etc.

“Whether he is a sinner or not, I don’t know. One thing I do know. I was blind but now I see!” Through stratified evangelism we give sight to those who were blind. The message of salvation!

Wisdom Siakanga is a 28 year old single man from Lilanda who makes a living by selling phone covers, headsets and USB cables. His side hustle involves teaching at Glory Academy to augment his income even though he doesn’t make much out of teaching in this community school. In the morning, during school days, Wisdom teaches at the Community School and in the afternoon, he is at his shop.

On one of the August afternoons, Wisdom was visited by some of our team members who had come from the Lusaka Mission. They asked him whether he was born again and whether he was sure he was going to heaven when he died. Wisdom informed them that he was a “Christian.” He had been going to the Roman Catholic Church but had since stopped going to church.

But as the missionaries begun to share the Gospel and explain what it really means to be a Christian and to be born again of the Spirit of God. Wisdom came to an understanding of what it means to be a Christian.

Clearly, he wasn’t a Christian. He had merely been religious. This explains why no matter how hard he tried to be a good Christian; he had always failed. He remembers how at some point he had a drinking problem. In fact, his drinking became so bad that it was affecting his business and his work at the community school. Sometimes, he would go to class drunk and usually in those situations his behaviour was not exemplary. At some point, the head teacher had to caution him for his drinking habit and his unbecoming behaviour.

Now that Wisdom understood what it meant to be a Christian, he really wanted to change and become a real Christian. Our team encouraged him to express this desire to the Lord in prayer. That afternoon, he opened his heart and accepted Jesus as his personal Lord and Saviour. His life immediately and completely changed.

He continued offering his services to Glory Academy Community School for a very small amount, which he confesses was somewhat frustrating. However, Wisdom is now looking at his teaching career in a completely new light. He is a man on a mission. He has completely given himself to teach full time. He has employed a person to work in his shop and hopes to go to college and train as a teacher.

He now prays with the children and holds devotion with them before class. He has also found a new church. Near his home, Christ Embassy Church, Lilanda. Wisdom is truly grateful for the team that visited him at his shop. That visit redirected his life completely.

Our team in Zambia was able to lead 15 souls to Christ in the month of November 2022.

KENYA



Ms. Lillian Imali is a pharmacist at the Soweto Kayole PHC Clinic in Nairobi and has worked on this project for over 13 years now. Lillian has been a witness to the growth of Soweto Kayole Clinic and the positive impact it has made in the lives of the local people for over three decades now.

“This clinic has greatly benefited many poor people in our community, unlike other facilities, we do not withhold or turn away any patient even if they don’t have the money to pay for the services, and we always find a way with our clients, such as treating them and making an agreement for them to clear the bill gradually,” says Lillian.

“In addition, due to the high poverty levels in our community, many times we also receive patients who have not had a meal for several days and we also seek how to get them some food that they can take home”. “Unlike other facilities, we consider ours a ministry and as we treat our patients, we also pray for them and offer them a word of encouragement from the Scriptures” adds Lillian.

Food Relief

SOUTH AFRICA



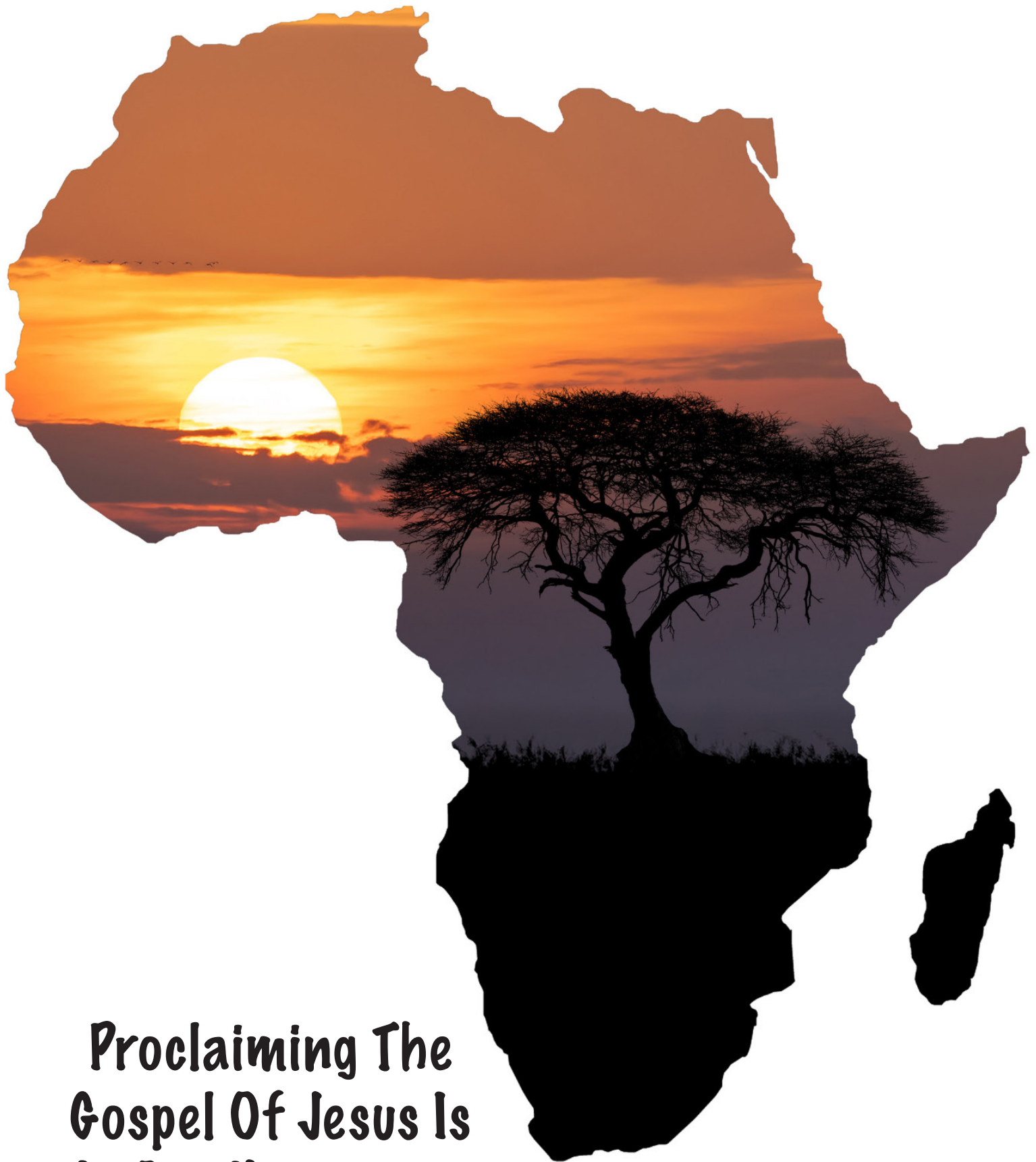
Our South Africa team through your support and prayers was able to visit a handicapped persons in Edendale on the 7th November. The community was largely impoverished and lacking in support of basic Needs.

We partnered with a disability centre in Edendale to provide this community with food relief and to use the opportunity to minister to them.

A number of the beneficiaries of the food relief parcels shared their feelings about being poorly treated and how they felt ignored by the State.

Majority of their households comprise of large families living in small spaces and their social grants are insufficient to meet their medical needs and address the basic food needs of those who are dependent on them.

African Enterprise was able to supply 40 food parcels to households in this community.

Women Empowerment

According to the European Institute of Gender Equality women's empowerment entails creating a sense of self-worth; having the right to determine choices; having the right to access opportunities and resources; the right to have power to control their own lives, both within and outside the home; and having the ability to influence the direction of social change to create a more just social and economic order both nationally and internationally.

Our social Action missions entails reaching out to women in our society and equipping them with the ability to change their financial capacity.

Ms. Rose, a 26-year-old mom in Kenya, dropped out of school due to financial challenges and turned to menial labour to fend for herself and her family. After moving to the city from their rural home, life became very difficult for Rose as finding a job proved futile and every sunrise brought with it fresh despair for Rose and her child.

Fortunately, one day a friend from their church referred Rose to Mathare Womens Project, where she was assessed and enrolled for vocational skills training.

Looking back, Rose wishes she had joined Mathare Womens' Project earlier as she continues to make steady progress in her skills training.

So far, Rose can design, cut and sew dummy dresses and she is very excited about the new skills that she is learning. Rose dreams about being an excellent fashion designer and eventually setting up her own business in future. We thank you our friends and partners for your continued support that is making a difference in the lives of Rose and many other women in Kenya.

Similarly, in Malawi, 18 women who are taking sewing lessons have learned how to make dresses, blouses and skirts .

When asked what she has learned so far , she responded "Apart from learning the vocational skills, my spiritual life has indeed been strengthened. I have been encouraged through prayers that are conducted daily here at school before we enter the sewing class.

"While here, I have also learned some key life lessons from my fellow women since we come from different cultural backgrounds." She explained.

Eunice who is eager to become a provider in her community, shared her plans after she graduates : "While acquiring my skills in tailoring, I have secured a shop that I will rent for my business soon after graduation from African Enterprise vocational school. I am glad to state that this has been an answer to my dreams ."

"I wish to offer some charitable services to the needy in my area in addition to meeting my family's basic needs."

Unity Replaced denominational barriers in Rwamagana



I am Pastor Jean Baptiste Mutokambari, I am 45 years old, I serve with the Anglican church of Rwanda in Rwamagana/ Janjagiro parish. In The Rwamagana mission, I was privileged to coordinate a mission site ,Janjagiro, and in partnership with African Evangelistic Enterprise Rwanda , we carried out evangelistic mission in Janjagiro.

Before the mission, AEE Rwanda brought us together in preparation for the mission.

We were gathered in coordination meetings, and we trained preservation facilitators who were to do follow up during the mission and after the mission.

In our zone, we selected 12 preservation facilitators

who helped us ,follow up with the new converts, and guide them to join churches.

Before the mission, every denomination used to do everything separately , but during the mission, I have seen denominations embrace each other and there has been a remarkable collaboration. This unifying factor was an outcome of trainings offered by AEE Rwanda.

This unity contributed a lot in the mobilisation of our community for mission because we were one.

Personally, I have learnt a lot of things in the mission;I have learnt that unity of the body of Christ is possible, I have seen denominations agreeing to some doctrines and accept to partner in evangelistic mission. I have seen the unity of the church in reality,not just words. Second, I have learned that the church of Christ is one. Amen!

From Sex work to intercession

My name is Nyirashyirambere Athansie , I am 53 years old and I live in Rwamagana Janjagiro village. I got saved in the open air campaign conducted in Rwamagana and Janjagiro in July 2022.

During the mission, I was invited by a believer who knew me even though she was not my friend, but she knew my sinful life before I met Christ, I was convinced that I had to attend the mission campaign with the expectation of receiving new life. I used to live in sinful behaviour; alcoholism and sexual immorality.

After I joined the mission campaign, I was moved by seeing and listening to choir songs, and I was really so touched and more so when the time for preaching came because it was my first time to hear the word of God . When the preacher was preaching, the word of God exposed my life and I felt a conviction of repenting my sins, then I received the supernatural power that enabled me to repent and to decide to repent.

Before I got saved, I was really addicted. Now that I am a new person and have joined the church (the Anglican Church), I have joined the intercessory team and choir member in my church. More than that, now I am experiencing transformation in my life and I am sure that it is not superficial but for eternity. My life changed forever!





Foxfire Teams are the youth arm of our mission activities.

The program's name comes from Judges 15:3-5. In this passage, Samson catches 300 foxes, ties torches to their tails, sets the torches on fire and releases them into the fields of the Philistines.

The vision of this ministry is to set youth ablaze with the Gospel of Jesus Christ and send them out into the world.

FOXFIRES

60% of Africa's population comprises of the youth under 25 years old. Our foxfires program is therefore a great catalyst for evangelism among our young people.

AESAR Zambia received 10 Fox Fires from African Enterprise South Africa who visited Lusaka and Kabwe from October 19 to October 27, 2022.

They set off on a 2200kms roadtrip and ministered in Levy Mwanawasa Medical University, University of Zambia and had open air outreaches in 3 markets- Matero, Misisi Football court and Mtendere markets.

They reached out to a total of 614 people, of which 436 committed their lives to Christ.

The Fox Fires were later joined by the Kubamba Krew, who arrived in Lusaka on October 22 and left on November 1.

The Kubamba Krew performed during the Legacy Family conference and later proceeded to Maranatha PAOG (Z) where they ministered in a crusade and the Kitwe Boys Secondary School

AESAR Zambia plans to do a School's Mission to reach primary, Secondary and tertiary schools partnering with Kubamba Krew, Fox Fire, Scripture Union Zambia, Campus Crusade for Christ Zambia and the Navigators for early 2024.



Trauma Healing in Juba

War is humanity's worst plague, when brothers and sisters turn against each other. South Sudan has been a victim of civil war resulting from tension from different ethnic groups.

Fahali wawili wakipigana nyasi humia is a common swahili saying that means when two bulls fight, it is the grass that gets hurt. Women and children suffer most during and post war.

Families are left without breadwinners, children are left orphaned not to mention thousands of people who become disabled by the effects of war.

In 2013, the tension between President Salva Kiir Mayardit and Vice President Riek Machar led to massive destruction of property, loss of lives, destruction of infrastructure, political instability and gross human rights violations. Approximately 2.2 million were displaced.

Our trauma healing program aims to address the trauma brought about by effects of war. Restoring healing and adopting safe ways of coping with trauma is a key catalyst in trauma healing.



Emmanuel Reuben Matoayo is a teacher at Juba Model Primary School. He is grateful to us for helping him to cope through the trauma brought by the 2013 civil war. He was dealing with the loss and grief of loved ones and property.

It is through our training that he received healing and transformation. "I started to experience peace of heart and mind and I have continued to develop a spirit of happiness. I have even gotten the strength to rejoin my church activities which I had stopped for almost many years since 2013 till May 2022.

"I would like to thank God and the AEES Team for the trauma healing training, which became a turning point in my life and an eye opener," narrates a happy Emmanuel.

Fare thee Well

It saddens our hearts to announce the tragic death of The former Team Leader AEE Kenya, Dr Gershon Mwiti. He served in this position from 1981 to 1997 when he left for the Fuller Theological Seminary in the USA to pursue his MBA.

He was among the fore runners in ensuring that AEE had a firm and stable foundation in Kenya.

Former colleagues recall his no non sense discipline stemming from his time as the former assistant commissioner of prisons in Kenya, a prestigious position he resigned from in order to take the reins at AEE Kenya.



He met founder Dr. Michael Cassidy on a flight to South Africa and struck up a conversation that led to friendship that laid the ground work for the advent of African Evangelistic Enterprise into Kenya.

He recruited our current International Team Leader Rev.Dr. Stephen Mbogo straight from campus in 1992 and tasked him with being the youth mission's coordinator. And it was this that led him down the path of global evangelism, a calling he honors diligently.

"I remember him as a man keen on details, meticulous and a strict time keeper. But he was also very loving and caring. I remember years back when heading back from a mission in Murang'a, we arrived back in Nairobi late at night, even though we were all tired, he insisted on dropping each one of us home in his small Toyota corolla and on the way to our homes, he took us to a small joint in town and bought each one of us Chips and Kuku. His heart was that of a giver. Even after my wife and I got married, he pulled strings and got us a room at the Methodist guest house in Lavington where we kicked off our honeymoon. His death has robbed us of a man who gave his all in his fight for a better nation. The body of Christ will surely miss his fighting spirit." narrates Dr. Mbogo.

He was also a writer of powerful books such as THE INCORRUPTIBLE: Leading with Integrity and Dignity among others, as well as the Founder of Leadership Institute of Kenya (LIKA), and former Chairman of the National Committee for Developing National Values of Kenya, whose concept formed Chapter 2/Clause 10 of the 2010 Constitution.

We continue to Pray for God's peace upon his wife, Dr Gladys Mwiti, and their children and grandchildren.

May his mantra, "I believe in evangelism, I preach it, I teach it, I defend it." keep on shining in all the ways he impacted people in one way or another.
