FRIENDSHIPS ACROSS THE AGES

African Enterprise has been blessed across the ages with an extraordinary number of friends who have helped inspire our work and keep it biblically and theologically faithful.

Billy Graham inspired us with his amazing dedication and the passionate nature of his Gospel proclamation. His inspiration also brought about the Berlin Congress in 1966, the Lausanne Congress in 1974, the Amsterdam Congresses in the early 1980s and then the Second World Congress on Evangelism in Manila in 1989. All of these congresses were attended by AE leadership and significantly impacted us.

John Stott was equally key as he influenced the development of our theology, most notably as enshrined in the Lausanne Covenant. He was a persistent encourager of AE throughout his life.

Then there was Francis Schaeffer, whose main emphasis was on the full authority and reliability of Scripture. He significantly impacted the shape and content of the Statement on Scripture in the Lausanne Covenant.

Archbishops Erica Sabiti and Janani Luwum of Uganda were very important influences on the ministry. They infused into us the DNA of the East African Revival. Also in East Africa was John Mpaayei, General Secretary of the Bible Society in



East Africa, the first black Kenyan graduate from Cambridge University and the first translator of the Bible into the Maasai language. He was a key figure, with Tom Huston and Don Jacobs, in running the pivotal Nairobi Mission in 1969, which launched AE's Pan African ministry.

Chuck Colson was another good friend and set for us the example of what it meant to be a prophet to his nation.

Doug Birdsall, Chairman of the Lausanne movement and key visionary for the third Lausanne World Congress in 2010, has been a great encourager, along with current chairman Michael Oh from South Korea, in drawing in Stephen Mbogo and Emmanuel Kwizera to Lausanne leadership roles across Africa.

When we look back, we are extremely grateful to God for all these extraordinary people. But we are equally thankful for friends like you who give and pray so faithfully.

This work would not be possible without you!

LOOKING BACK: YOUR IMPACT ON MISSION IN 2021

2021 may have been another challenging year, with the continued presence of COVID causing difficulties around the world, but God was certainly still at work!

The life-changing impact of African Enterprise missions continued across Africa in 2021. With your generous support, we conducted 11 missions that were able to provide essential opportunities to preach the Gospel to the unreached. We were able to share the Gospel with over 12 million people through radio, television, social media, street evangelism, mission events and door-to-door evangelism. More than 46,000 people made decisions to follow Christ through these activities.

Over the last five years, thanks to your continued generosity, we have reached 22 million people, and praise God, 450,000 souls committed to following Jesus! These numbers are extraordinary and only possible through the support of our partners. Many of you have courageously upheld AE through prayers, hard work and financial giving.

Despite the challenges of COVID, God has been incredibly faithful. Even when the movements of mission teams have been restricted, God has still opened doors, enabling the Gospel message to go out without hindrance.

And throughout it all, your brothers and sisters in Christ in Africa have continued to grow in their faith.

Eyobed from Ethiopia says that his life has been greatly impacted by AE's Discipleship Program. He has enjoyed all the courses and loves to read the Bible. Eyobed has also become involved in training others.



THANK YOU FOR HELPING TO END THE CYCLE

With your support, AE's Social Action Projects continue to equip young people with the skills they need to end the cycle of poverty and become the leaders of the future. Here are just a few highlights!

In 2021, Agnes' dream of becoming a mechanic came true after she enrolled as a Motorcycle Cycle Repair and Maintenance apprentice at Faluku Motor Spare Garage in Kiyunga. She completed her studies through the Technical Vocational Education and Training (TVET) project by AEE Uganda in partnership with Stromme Foundation.

"I'm proud to be the first girl to do Motorcycle Mechanics in Kiyunga," says Agnes. "I have started getting clients before even completing the training because most people want to see how girls repair motorcycles. I feel empowered and motivated."

AE Ghana was able to help combat the spread of COVID-19 in schools, with twelve hand-washing devices with liquid soaps and paper towels installed in June 2021. The new devices will serve over 1,500 students in the school.

In Uganda, The Early Childhood Development Centre at Bukahna Primary school, home to 64 students, underwent a renovation. The school, one of five that AE Uganda supports, had a dilapidated building that discouraged parents from bringing their children to the centre.

Head Teacher Charles Nabeeta says, *"The classrooms were in very bad shape, making the whole environment non-conductive*



"I received Jesus Christ seven years ago, but real-life transformation started after joining the discipleship program. Now, whenever I am out of work, my first place of visit is my church. I feel a closer relationship with church members and especially with the students I met," says Eyobed.

Your support is also ensuring that people in difficult situations can know the love of Christ in action.


Following the Kayonza Mission in Rwanda, Pastor Gatera was blessed to receive seven new converts in his church. He has also helped young girls who are facing unwanted pregnancies, and after preaching the Gospel to them, he bought goats for them to start businesses.

"We have another group of new converts that we gave 30 Bibles to," says Pastor

Gatera. *"We are intentional in helping these new brothers and sisters in Christ with their growth both spiritually and economically."*

These are just a few examples of the lives that are being changed thanks to the work of AE. God is using His disciples to transform entire communities and bring hope and healing to some of the most impoverished nations in the world.

In South Sudan, AE has continued to roll out Trauma Healing Programs in schools in response to the sustained conflict that this country has experienced in recent years. Trauma Healing Clubs have been established, where students participate in healing activities.

Joyce Christopher testifies that the Trauma Healing Book has taught her many things and has brought healing in her life. She hopes that her club members will be healed too.

A GLIMPSE OF AE HISTORY:

How the Pan African Christian Leadership Assembly began – and its role in ending apartheid.

In March 1974, the South African Congress on Mission and Evangelism took place in Durban. This gathering, the first of its kind, drew together 800 leaders from all races and from most denominations in the South African Church to confer together for ten days. AE invited several East African leaders to attend. These men were so struck by what they saw in Durban and by its huge impact that they were ready for the suggestion from AE's Michael Cassidy of another gathering: a Pan African Christian Leadership Assembly, drawing Christian leaders from all the countries of Africa.

The vision took hold, and in December 1976, the first PACLA meeting took place in Nairobi. There were 800 delegates from 49 out of Africa's 51 countries and from every denomination.

By a miracle, 70 delegates from South Africa secured visas at the very last moment to travel to Kenya for PACLA. This was a particular blessing as the South African group had been dealing with serious internal



struggles, deeply linked to the issues in South Africa at the time. But at PACLA, some marvellous reconciliations took place, and the newly united group were inspired to run a South African counterpart to PACLA. This finally came forth in 1979, when 5000 delegates met in Pretoria. This gathering enabled a number of new relationships, which contributed significantly to the final ending of apartheid!

PACLA established a network of relationships across Africa which survives in the next generation even to this day and continues to bring about real and lasting change in the African Church, and across the continent as a whole.

DAVID IS PROUD TO CARRY ON THE FAMILY LEGACY OF SUPPORTING AE

African Enterprise supporter David Le Rossignol first heard about AE through a visiting speaker at his local church in Tasmania.

David's own father was born in Port Elizabeth in South Africa, and his wife's father was born in Kenya – and, as David found out, an avid AE supporter. With such strong links to Africa, David was motivated to become a supporter.


David says he always looks forward to AE's newsletters because they inspire him to be in ministry in his own community in Tasmania. "Just to follow what God is doing in His world is amazing!" he says.

David's grandfather is buried in the St John's Methodist Cemetery in Port Elizabeth in South Africa, and David and his family are proud to honour their African heritage by continuing to support the transformational work of AE.

During the past two years, COVID-related lockdowns impacted our ability to present the work of AE to churches and individuals in Australia, NZ and Hong Kong, and engage new supporters.
